## Report on the use of Pupil Premium: Duxford C of E Community Primary School (2011-12,2012-13, 2013-14, 2014-15, 2015-2016, 2016-2017)

Overview	The Pupil Premium is designed to ensure that funding to tackle disadvantage reaches the pupils who need it most. The funding is allocated to Local Authorities and schools with pupils from Reception to Y11 who are eligible for free school meals (FSM), are looked after or have parents currently in the Armed Forces. In 2016/17 the funding allocated is £1,320 per child, £300 for children of Armed Forces families.  From April 2012 the coverage of the Premium was widened to include those eligible for FSM at any point in the last six years.  Premium Plus was introduced with a higher rate of funding of £1,900 for  Looked after children (LAC)  Children adopted from care  Children who leave care under a special guardianship order or residence order

Explain how the previous year's allocation was spent?	The school used the previous year's allocation for intervention groups and to narrow attainment gaps between FSM and non-FSM pupils. The school monitors the outcomes of these intervention groups closely to ensure that this is impacting on vulnerable pupils' progress. Specific groups included:  • Catch up literacy or numeracy sessions  • 1:1 tuition See table below for detailed account
How will the money be spent this academic year?	As last year, the school is using this year's allocation for intervention groups and to narrow attainment gaps between FSM and non-FSM pupils. The school will monitor the outcomes of these intervention groups closely to ensure that this is impacting on vulnerable pupils' progress.  • Examples of the groups to be supported are detailed below.
Statement about the effect of the expenditure on the educational attainment of those pupils who were eligible for pupil premium	The school will have quantitative and qualitative data to demonstrate the overall progress of pupils captured within the free school meal group. Tracking progress is undertaken using the school's Management Information System and, alongside other vulnerable groups, FSM pupils' progress is reviewed as a key indicator in a variety of contexts.  Our data (July 2016)shows that the interventions and strategies that the school have put in place continues to enable this group of children to close the gap and that they continue to show good or better progress compared to their cohort.
